Small-town roots run deep

Natives of Boone, Iowa, who moved out West get together for the 95th straight year.

BUENA PARK – Boone, Iowa, is a small city of about 13,000 people just north of Des Moines. But it's a hard place to forget.

Just ask the 50 people, all part of the Boone, Iowa Society of Southern California, who gathered Saturday at the Knott's Berry Farm Resort Hotel. Every year since 1914, society members have held a luncheon, gathering together for what essentially becomes a Hawkeye family reunion, this year being their 95th.

"Isn't that something — 95 years?" mused Don "Red" Houser, 78, who grew up in Boone but is now a Tustin Ranch resident. "I started coming here in '65 when I moved out here. We really enjoy communicating, and telling tales from the past."

With this crowd, no one walked through the door without breaking into a smile. Somewhere in the small group was someone they recognized, an old neighbor from up the street, an elementary school classmate, a football team comrade.

"It's a fantastic thing to have this fellowship, visit a few old friends, and tell a few lies," said Max Moore, 81, now of Yorba Linda. "We want to make it 'Old Home Week.' That's what this is all about."

In the early part of the 20th century, Iowans began to congregate in Southern California, attracted by opportunities and a climate far different than the stinging Midwestern winters. Long Beach, where an annual picnic used to attract crowds in the tens of thousands, earned the nickname, "Iowa by the Sea." The Boone crowd branched off and held an additional annual gathering of its own.

Harry Echternach's mother, Norma Echternach, attended the annual affair from about 1953 to earlier this decade, when she died at age 102. Harry Echternach, 80, keeps up the tradition now that running his Brea flower shop doesn't take up as much of his time.

"It's friends, meeting people," he said of the reasons he comes. "It's always the same group."

The crowd that comes is hardy. One woman came from the small Bay Area city of Castro Valley, another couple from Fresno. Many more headed to Buena Park from La Mirada, Seal Beach, and other local spots.

They sang songs, including the Iowa Corn Song ("We're from I-O-way, I-O-way. That's where the tall corn grows...").

"We'd be very disloyal if we didn't sing the Corn Song," Society President Larry Moore said.

They talked about current events in Boone – the event's program sported two pages of obituaries from the past year – and much of the talk was about the fire that heavily damaged three of Boone's downtown buildings, requiring firefighters to come in from Ames, 30 miles away, to help to put it out.

"Over the years, we've had 3-, 4-, 500 people come to the event," Larry Moore said, though he said the numbers have dwindled as the crowd gets older. But they have a goal, he added: "We're trying to see if we can get to 100 straight years."
