## Fight song's origin revealed

You clap your hands and mumble some of the words, but do you really know how BHS got its own school song?

The "Boone Toreadors" song has been in existence since February of 1958, according to former BHS newspaper, the *Bumble "B."* 

BHS offered a contest to see who could write the best school fight song.

In response to the contest, some students decided to work with high school band director Gordon McLean to write the song.

The students wanted to have a song to claim as their own. Students were tired of playing "Illinois Loyalty" and other common school songs, the newspaper wrote.

The music and arrangement were done by Gordon McLean, the high school band director

at BHS from the fall of 1956 to the spring of 1964.

According to middle school chorus director Jo Ann Howell, students approached Mr. McLean to write the song.

"I know the song was requested by band students of Mr. McLean," Mrs. Howell said. "It was a collaborated effort."

Dave Richardson, band director at BHS, said the school song consisted of "Boone Toreadors," "Illinois Loyalty" and the "Washington Lee Swing Song," when he first arrived in 1978. The latter two were taken out of the song while he taught here.

He said the change was made about fifteen years ago because it was too lengthy at basketball games.

David Howell, class of 1965, said "Illinois Loyalty" was once the junior high school song.

The fight song is still here today to add pride and school spirit to BHS students.
